A wee update on the magnolia plant - it has produced one small purple flower (woo-hoo!), but still looks sickly. I'm told it may be due to the soil being too alkaline.

The front cover picture and the picture above are both products of my continued cheapskate existence, waiting for my pension to be paid. Still not a brass farthing has come my way. Whilst cleaning and tidying the kitchen I found an almost out-of-date bag of *Asda Basics Batter Mix* in one of the cupboards, and some "forgotten" sausages in the freezer. So I decided to make some toad in the hole. My oven is broken but I have two air fryers, both of which are "doubles" that can be made into a single large compartment.

I did need one egg though, and they're not cheap these days. The following is not necessarily the best method, but it's what I did. Andy York will be hiding behind the sofa.

Take a small baking tray and brush it with a *little* sunflower oil. Part-cook the sausages on the baking tray inside the air fryer "megazone" for 8 minutes at 180C. This releases some extra fat for the batter. Whilst the sausages are cooking, put 200ml water and one egg in a bowl. Whisk the egg into the water and add the batter mix in stages. Open the air fryer, arrange the sausages and pour the batter mix over. Cook for 15 minutes at 180C, then turn the sausages (if possible) and cook for another 5 minutes at 190C to crisp the batter.

The other piece of cheapskatery was setting up a stand for my synthesizer in my "music zone". I already had a keyboard stand, and it works with the DeepMind 6 when standing up, but for seated playing the keyboard is not wide enough to sit on the struts (a DeepMind 12 would be). Installing the cube units (see last issue) meant the demise of an old shelf - aha! Just whack it on top and I even have some space for headphones or other nick-nacks.

My mum's 96th birthday was also a low-cost affair, with none of myself, my sister and my niece being flush with money, we ended up going to an open-air play at Exbury Gardens. It was *The Three Musketeers* performed by a 6-strong troupe called [Illyria](#). The tickets were a modest £21 and we brought our own wine and sandwiches. Weather was perfect and the show was very well done - quite faithful to the original story and I was impressed with the sword-fighting choreography. It did make me think of *En Garde!* and I'm sure *Guy Zaquisse*, *Rene Camembert* and *Pierre Stazapharte* would all have approved.

My problem with the fitness watch touch screen was cured by letting the battery run down, but it didn't have to drain to nothing. When it got to about 40% the screen started working again. Duck Assist said: "A smartwatch touch screen may start working again after the battery drains partially because the device can reset itself when the battery is low, clearing temporary software glitches." Hmmm.

I have seen Kansas across the bridge from Kansas City, Missouri. Hannah has been to Alaska and Jacqueline to Mississippi, crossing over from Memphis Tennessee for a donut. I've also used Salt Lake City (Utah) and Denver (Colorado) airports but these don't count. I enjoyed your games Kallax picture, several games in there brought back the urge to want to play a game just for fun! So much so I suggested Linie1 at a recent games session, but we had to play Metro instead, and it was an entertaining evening with Machi Koro (minus the expansion set that ruined it), plus a Groo! I was always a fan of Kremlin, Attika, Killer Bunnies and Mississippi Queen, those were great to play. A lot of the recent games seem to fall into heavy duty "engine building" with some luck thrown in on the cards drawn. I like Wingspan but it's kind of gameplay set in aspic.

I had to Google "Kallax" - not a planet in a sci-fi story, rather Ikea's cube storage brand name. Some older games age better than others, and of those you list, Kremlin can be a very long game (depending on waving success) and you can be effectively out of contention quite early on. Great theme though. Killer Bunnies is considered a bit rubbish by many (only rated 5.5 on BGG) though I thought it was quite fun.

My Kallax's are not bracketed to the wall, one. Long axis on the floor, serves as a drink cabinet and has our ceramics, one large picture and other small art bits displayed on top. The other is serving as a record cabinet, standing up and sans brackets. I live dangerously as I pullout, put in or generally sort out the 5 slots currently housing vinyl.

ALBUM REVIEWS

As I hinted at last time, with no new CDs being bought I am reviewing a couple of discs I bought in 2022 and have recently been listening to. Both albums were ones I played a lot on vinyl but didn't replace with a CD or download, so there were many years between listens, and I may have rose-tinted eardrums.

Pat Metheny Group - Travels (2CD) (1983 / 2022 Reissue)



They say that rock and roll is a group playing three chords watched by a thousand people, whilst jazz is a group playing a thousand chords watched by three people.

So what about a mixture of the two? Jazz-rock and Fusion are both popular genres with different flavours.

I have always been a fan of Brand X and Weather Report, and also Pierre Moerlen's Gong that was namechecked last issue. For solo artists, I like French violinist Jean-Luc Ponty and Norwegian guitarist Terje Rypdal. Also Allan Holdsworth - another great jazz-rock guitarist who, along with Metheny, pioneered the use of the guitar synthesizer.

I played my vinyl copy of Travels a lot, much more than any of Pat Metheny's other records. He is, without doubt, an absolutely brilliant guitarist, and has collaborated with many excellent musicians (such as virtuoso keyboardist Lyle Mays) but I've found some of his output to be a little too "smooth" for my tastes.

Travels was recorded in 1982 and released in 1983, long before his more commercial albums such as *Still Life Talking* and *Letter From Home*. So its 11 tracks represent a "best of" his earlier material. The tracks are not performed with much urgency, definitely more jazz than rock (apart from the first track) but with a big smile and plenty of soloing for all the performers, not just the lead guitarist. Note that Rick Beato recently praised the guitar solo from *Song for Bilbao* on YouTube, but struggled to play it :-)

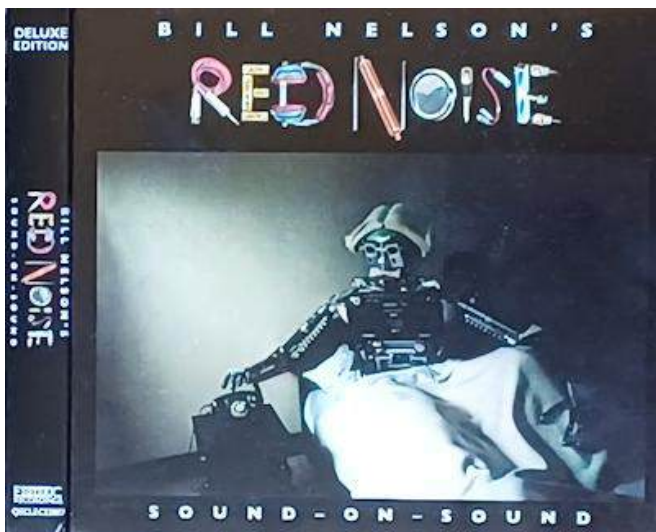

Bill Nelson's Red Noise - Sound of Sound (2CD) (1979 / 2022 Reissue)



Sound on Sound was Bill Nelson's take on late 70s new wave. The album was not a commercial success. Some compared it (unfavourably) to Talking Heads and it was also described as a cross between Be Bop Deluxe and Devo, whilst being unlikely to appeal to fans of either.

Devo's only other link to prog rock was that Brian Eno produced the 1978 album *Q: Are We Not Men? A: We Are Devo*, which is the only Devo album I own. My favourite Be Bop Deluxe album at the time was *Modern Music* whose melodic and proggy tracks (sample link below) couldn't be more different to the spiky attack of Sound on Sound.



Despite the lack of melody, the frenetic rhythms, and very few guitar solos, the songs are all really good (IMHO). Some of them quite catchy too, though definitely still rock rather than pop. This despite the use of keyboard and saxophone arrangements reminiscent of *The Selector* and *Madness* on some tracks. Neither of the singles *Furniture Music* nor *Revolt Into Style* made the top 40 (#59 and #69).

Time has been kind to the album in that many now think quite highly of it. For example, in the CD booklet Steven Wilson describes how influential it was for him. Not everyone agrees though and reviews of the album vary widely.

The 2CD version sports two version of the album from 2022. Disc 1 is a remaster of the original mix, and Disc 2 is a remix by Stephen W Tayler. The remix arguably suits the music better as it loses the "politeness" of the original making it a more intense aural assault.

For bonus tracks, disc 1 has two from the B-side of the Furniture Music EP, and disc 2 has the same two remixed, plus one unreleased track and early versions of tracks that would appear on Bill Nelson solo records, recorded at the Red Noise Sessions, RAK Studios, May 1979

- Null: Do not take a Würfel this round
- KUR: Take a Würfel but no numbers this round
- -1: Refuse all the numbers this round
- -2: Refuse all the numbers and decrement the count of one of your Würfels
- Suppen-Kasper: Create an extra round from your leftovers plate

There will be 8 rounds this time so double-wordling is more doable, and players are less likely to overly benefit from an “easy” Wordle. Note that plurals are now allowed, but target words will not be plurals, will not contain duplicate letters, and will not contain the letter X.

The game could do with 1, 2 or 3 more players but will work with 9, albeit the Wordle scores are likely to be greater than the BPD scores. The stats for the last game with 11 showed BPD points a bit higher.

New players will start on the lowest score, currently 9.

A new set of random 5-letter words have been allocated. Whilst some are perhaps a little “easier” than others there’s not a great deal in it. Unsurprisingly, not many Wordle points were scored this round but getting a valid word helps narrow the options for next time.

The theme for round 1 was **Drugs**.

- 1) A large pharmaceutical company (Pfizer 3)
- 2) A painkiller (Aspirin 4)
- 3) A disease that has a vaccine (COVID, Influenza, Tetanus 2)
- 4) A popular recreational drug (Cannabis 3)
- 5) A famous song about drugs (Heroin 2)

Of course there are very many songs about drugs, so good for Wordle, bad for BPD. “Cocaine”, “Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds”, “Golden Brown”, “Ebenezer Goode”, “Sweet Leaf” are just a few I could name.

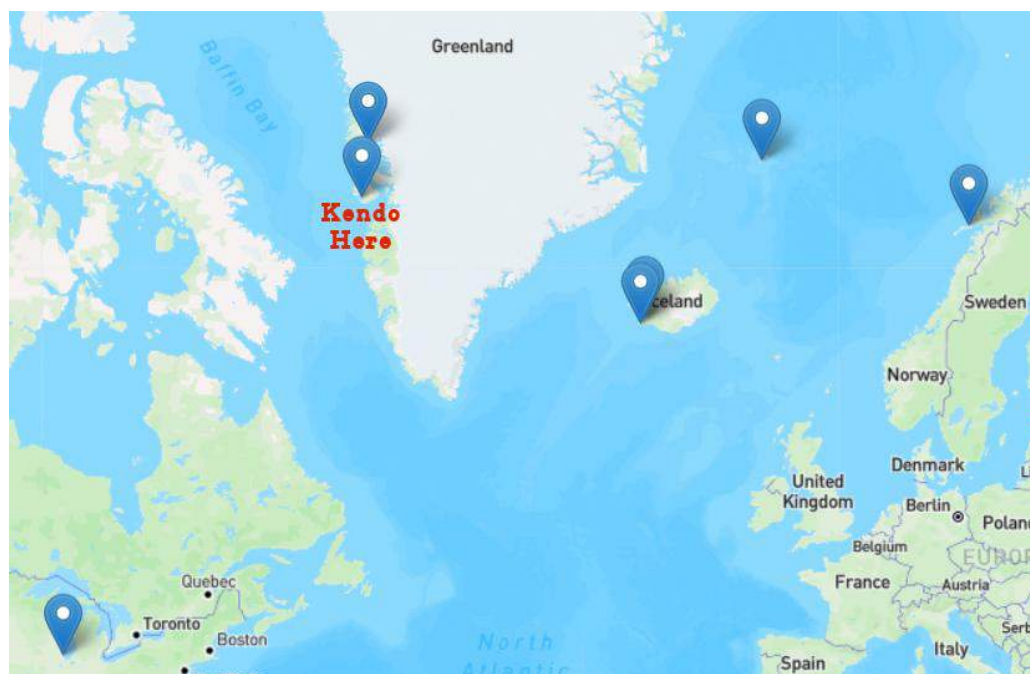

their guess blanked out from the turn report, and they receive a *yellow card* (two yellows means elimination) from ~~Rob Brydon~~ the GM. At the end of rounds 7-9, it's the same except they now get a *red card* meaning elimination from the game.

My money was on Dane up to this point as he was the first to identify Kendo, and was looking in the right area. Chris did survive an early yellow card to get a handy nearest in R6 with Anne Wibble (who sounds like a Monty Python character), and later spotted the *Disco Island* and *Kanga Look* wordplays.

I don't print everyone's workings but I have added an explanatory note for each round, and I've reinstated the red and yellow card guesses (also restored to the tester page). As you can see it was always the most southerly that was furthest until R7, where it was the most easterly.

Game end comments are welcome and preference for the next game. I am going with another Destination X, but that could be changed after the R1 guesses are in. A regular game would be fine, as would another Temperature Control (hot, warm, cold) which works well with my tester page.

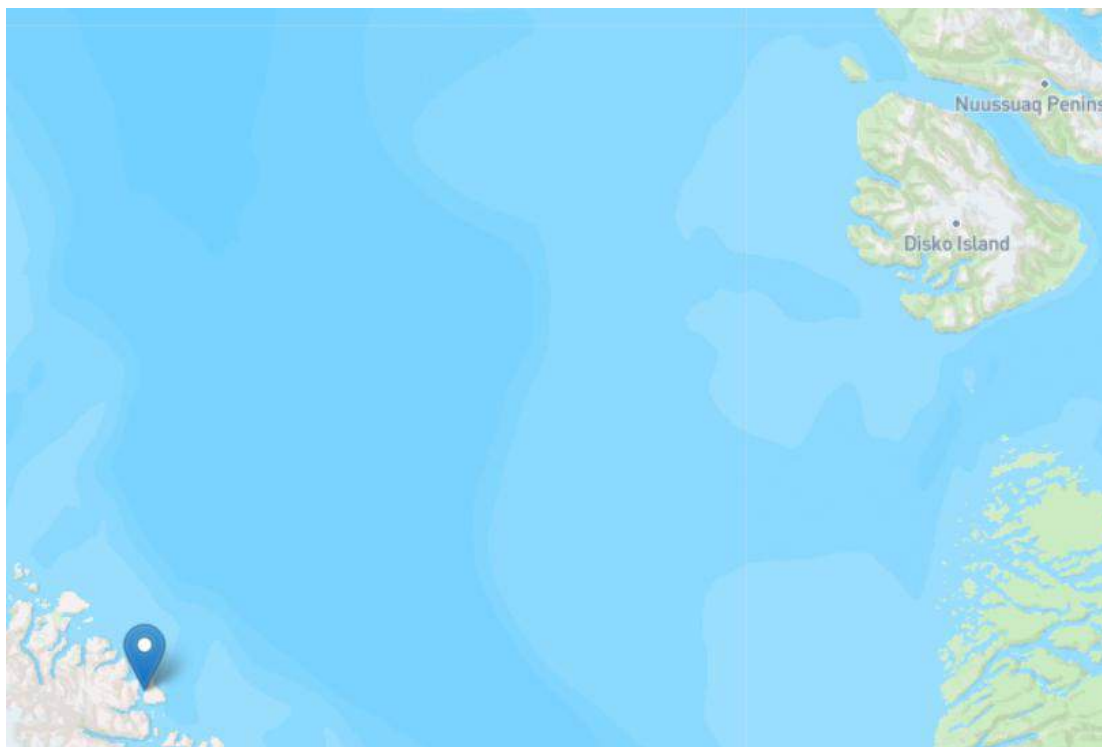

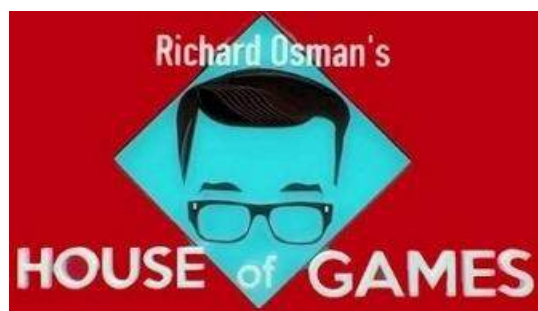

A third (five-round) outing for the rather fun "guessing" version of (Richard Smith's) House of Games. All the games are ones where you have to take a punt, rather than resorting to Google or ChatGPT.

For "Thursday" I have replaced *Half-Arted* with a round of *Bits of Hits* - will grotty guitar playing be an upgrade on dreadful drawings? We shall see / hear.

The BBC has announced series 10 of House of Games will air in November, and *Michael Sheen* is taking over from Richard Osman. I think he'll be great.

New players start on the lowest score, currently 12.

Bob Pitman and Steve Guest pull clear of the chasing pack.

Distinctly Average: The number of moons is higher than most people would think, though there was one very high guess. The Joe Root one is tough for those who don't follow cricket, but he was in the news recently for reaching 14,000 runs, the second most in history and closing in on Sachin Tendulkar's 16,000. The number of fish in the ocean is of course an estimate, with 3.5 trillion being the current best guess. As with the moons, the average was skewed by one very large guess.

I'm Terrible at Dating: I think these were a bit harder to guess than usual. One can envisage crude eyeglasses being around 1000 years ago, and the cosmic rays must be 20th century. Complex numbers anywhere in between.

Where Is Kazakhstan?: Three players actually knew where the stadia were!

You Spell Terrible: The Motorhead lyric is moderately well-known, with a number of ways to go wrong on the spelling. The board games one is also moderately well-known and even harder to spell. Onomatopoeia (I also accepted Onomatopoeic) is the only one I would have spelt correctly if I was playing.

Half-arted: House of the Dragon would have been a gimme with a better drawing. Bridge of Lies was made easier with the postal game about to be run - 8NT is an impossible contract at Bridge, so must be a lie! I think the Traitors picture should really have had a drawing of Claudia Winkleman or perhaps the round table, as there are other TV shows that feature treachery and backstabbing.

Answer Smash: You needed know your Burnhams from your Barnums this time. The Andy Burnham one is a little apt as he is often pictured out jogging, trying to reduce the size of his moobs. I think the Boston Red Sox are pretty well known in the UK despite being a baseball team.

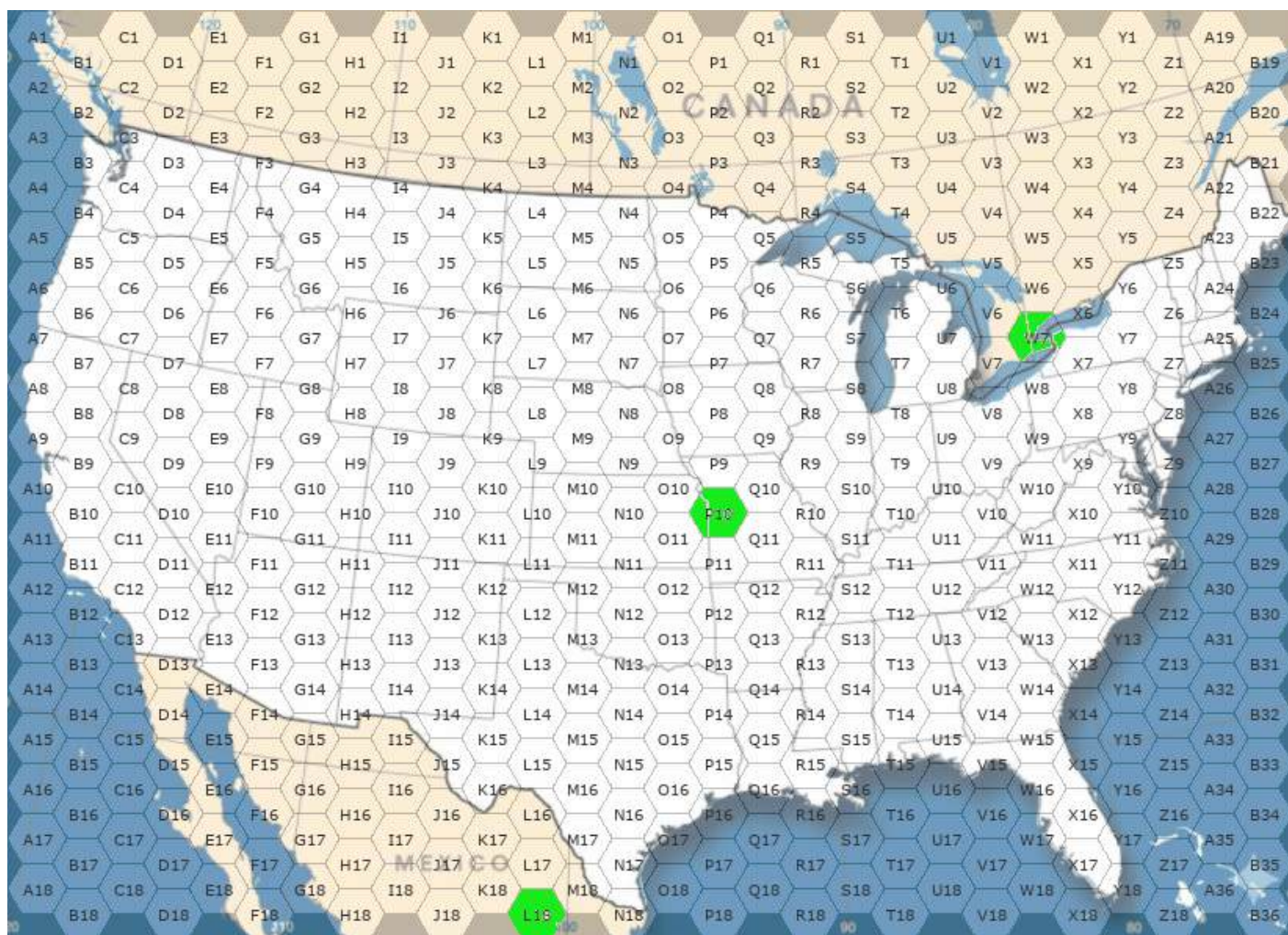

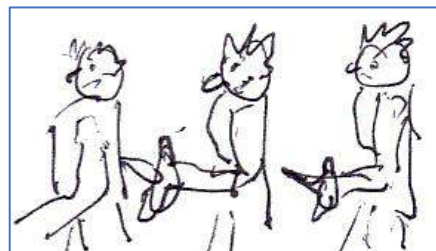

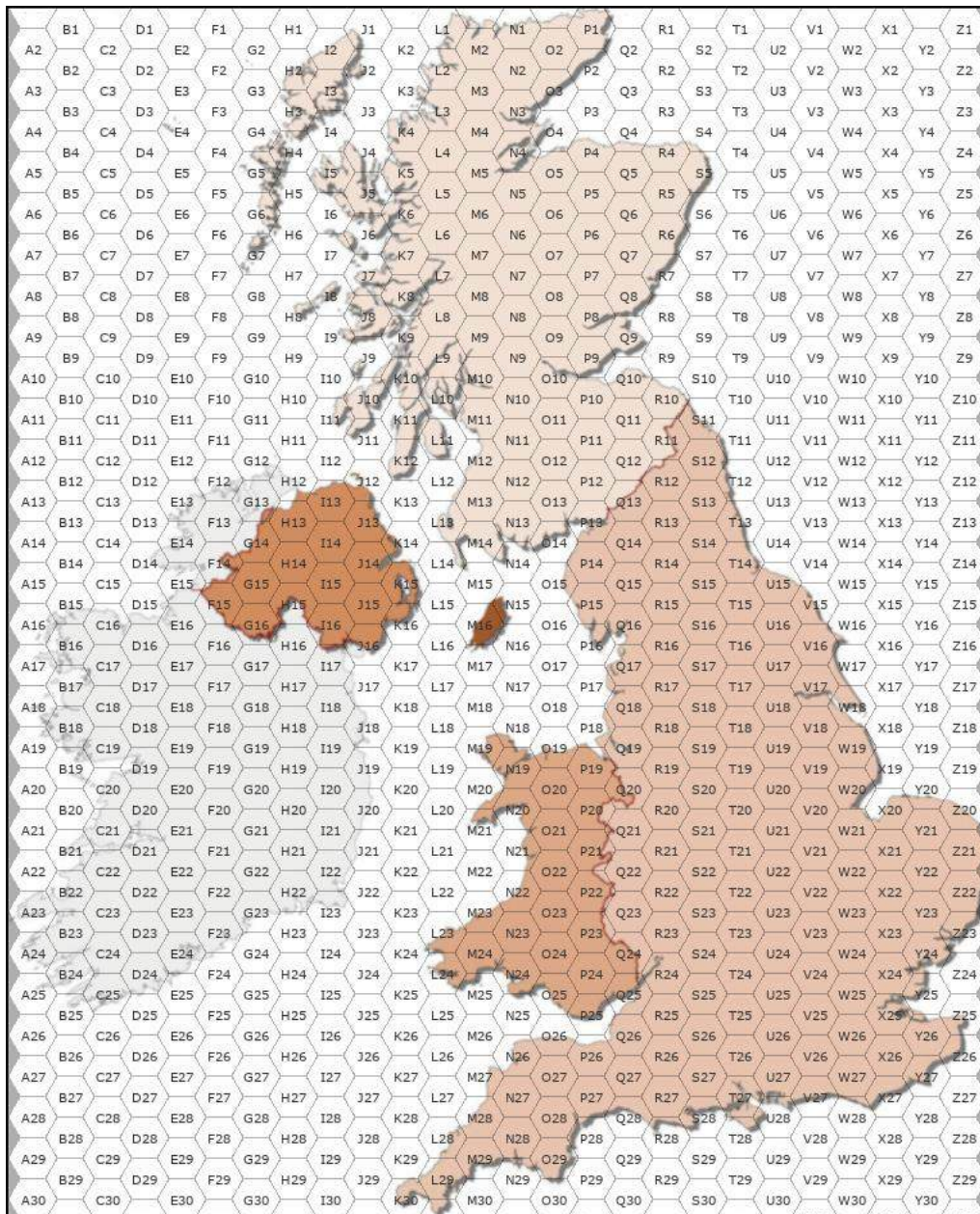

The popular start location was Djougou, but only one could start there and Jim won that.

GM note: A reminder about the special border rules. It costs +1 from build allowance to build across the border between Togo and Benin until Round 10. There is no similar administration/pip cost for building across other international borders. At present it also costs 4 points paid from treasury to the bank to build across the border; this reduces to 2 points in Rounds 4-6 and to 1 point in Rounds 7-9. It also costs 1 pip and 1 point to run each race across this border in Rounds 7-9 and this applies to each border crossing if the race crosses the border more than once. There are no extra build or race costs in Rounds 10-12.

To clarify river locations, there is no river adjacent to Djougou (but two rivers have their sources nearby) and a river runs West of Porto Novo. There is only one crossing point into Niger, over the Niger River at Malanville.

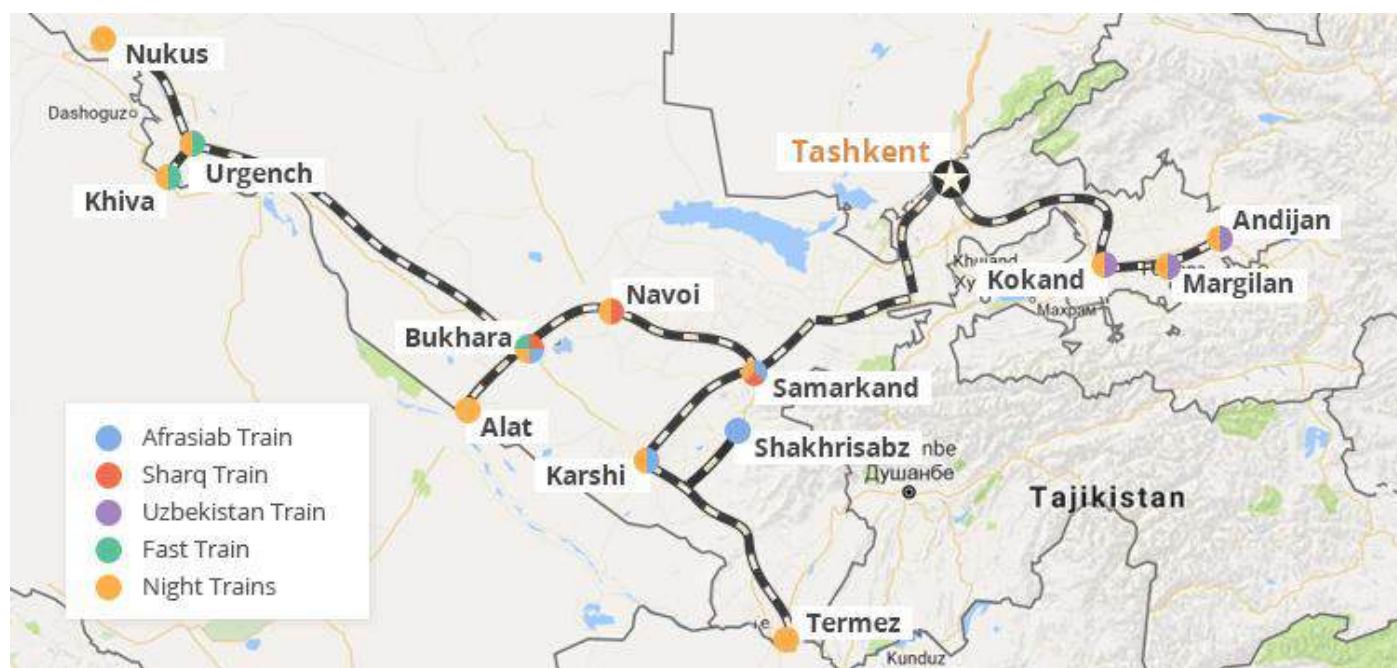

The equitable starts generator, fed some widely different selections, gave the results to the left (three 1st, one 2nd and one 3rd). The only other combination to score 12 points was [John gets Nukus (1st), Bob gets Jizzakh (1st), Brad gets Koson (3rd), Steve gets Tashkent (2nd) and Jim gets Namangam (1st)] with Brad getting the unloved Koson start instead of Steve.

Nukus seems to polarise opinion. The player starting there gets the west to himself but then has to use some of those nice 6 UZS bonuses to bulldoze into the crowded east to get near the 50s and 60s. The test I did seemed pretty even between all the starts. If I had to choose one, I would go for Namangam, but Jizzakh has the most options so could be a winner, or perhaps just a "kingmaker".

MARS only enters three races but wins them all, while ROGER has a comparatively less successful round and drops back to third place (with the advantage of being first to make the next purchases). CACHU just manages to enter Race 6 with a route length exactly double the shortest entry. For new routes Beaumaris proves to be popular, MARS sticks to the coast and ROGER goes to the seaside while CACHU hoovers up four short routes.

GM notes:

- 1). As a clarification, so long as part of the route is over your own track you can enter any race – it does not need to be your track at the start or end of the route.
- 2). Each change of colour at a junction or town adds +1 to the pip length and counts when determining whether an entry is prohibited for being more than double the shortest route.
- 3). Players were notified of an error in the Round 7 report: in Race 9 town 7H was Llangefni.
- 4). There are now 6 races to unconnected destinations so those will be reoffered in Round 9, but with no increase in the maximum number of race entries allowed.

I can see that leapfrog is not necessary for 3 players but would suggest that it is recommended for 4 players given in particular the shortage of West to East routes but also the narrow passes elsewhere.

I do not like the spurious and largely inactive Chinese claims to "disputed areas" as a special and believe that if China claims such areas there should be access from and to China through them. Two specific connection points may be accurate currently but not in combination with "disputed areas".

End Game Statements

Richard Smith (BOTI - 2nd and map designer): I think this map works well with three players, as there are three pretty even starts, and the size of the map means most towns are connected by the end of R6. I don't think it really needs leapfrog, and the reason for this is the "thinning" of the mountains. Quite a lot of the open hexes on the map are really smaller mountains. I like the idea of the monasteries being a special and all of them being at elevation, which they mostly are in Bhutan, though surprisingly only one got connected in this game (B32 might have been profitable for Brad or Steve).

I chose Phuntsholing for my start town as you can be first to Thimphu and have a bit of a monopoly in the southwest. The downside is the other two companies will have established east-west lines (along the south coast and the crucial "short cut" through Nubding, Trongsa and Jakar) before you get there. Congratulations to Brad, assuming he holds on, though I expect the final scores to be pretty close.

Bob Gingell (GM): It looks as if in both games in CSL the Eastern starter has done well, and building the route from SE to NW has played a big part in that. The mountain pass at Nubding does seem to be very important, as is Thimphu which all players connected to. I think that HEART was disadvantaged by having two parallel West to East routes whereas the other companies were able to rely on only one. Leapfrog was rarely used so I agree with Richard that it does not seem necessary on this map, at least with 3 players.

WIERER spent a lot renting STYLE's lines, which certainly helped STYLE's success this round. NIR's weak showing compared to the others results in a trailing position, but the game is still young.

No entries for the Innsbruck race (STINK could've run for 6 to ROGER) and the big west to east run in race 8 was done via XRP (not a JR) so lots of dice to roll for me. After 15 dice, BUST were just ahead but the 16th fling favoured ROGER and it finished B52 - R51.

A decent haul for most companies except for STIFY whose woes continue. They would have won the final race had STINK not paid them to shave off one pip. One would think 7 vs. 7 is a quite likely draw.

STINK decided expensive builds to the west may not be economically sound, whilst BUST paid 12 in fees to get to Mals, which I think could well be recouped. ROGER established a Swiss connection and possible entry to R1 (at a cost of 9, but could be a net 3). STIFY also made it over the Swiss border - a great escape perhaps?

All of the dungeon has now been discovered, and the exit, guarded by the Dragon revealed. The Ring is now in play (and Sirrus has it). Adventurers are now permitted to attack each other.

See also F2F rules PDF for the rules for the “old spikey” trap that is blocking the way to the exit https://variablepig.org/rules/bod/bodrules_v3.pdf

Remember also that if the ring bearer escapes from the dungeon, the other characters have one turn to do likewise before the dungeon collapses.

Report for Round 9:

Turn order: Sirrus, Torvok, Alendra

Sirrus picks up the Acme Insurance certificate, and holding it in his shield hand moves two spaces to the south (2AP) to wait for the other adventurers by the trap. He is happy to swap items around as needed and suggests the Acme Insurance might be a good one to feed to the trap.

No item swapping was ordered for Round 9, but it can be done at the start of round 10 at no AP cost by adventurers on the same square. And of course we need to know how Torvok gets on with the chest...

Torvok decides to risk opening the chest (1AP). On a 1-4 he sets off the trap and gets 5 damage, on a 5-6 he opens it successfully and gets two items...

... (GM rolls a 3) Bang! He gets reduced to 3 health so decides not to try opening the chest again. It remains where it is and can either be ignored in future rounds, or another attempt made to open it. He moves 2 spaces to the south (2AP) and joins Sirrus by the trap.

Alendra moves to the Healing Pool and uses its last heal. The rules require adventurers to end their turn at the pool, so she cannot move south yet. She can reach the space next to the trap next time, after Torvok's move but before Sirrus - so she could take an item from Sirrus but Torvok would need to drop something for her.

Round 10 Actions:

Turn order: Torvok, Alendra, Sirrus,

Inventory: Characters may rearrange items (no AP) cost, and characters can also swap items and this requires conditional orders from both, unless they are on the same square at the start of the turn.

Move, Collect Items, Use Items, Combat: Characters can use some or all of their remaining APs moving to known tiles. Collecting items does not cost an AP, but using items usually does (cost on tile). Combat is always the last action but remaining APs can be used to deploy items and / or escape.

Note that there is a monster waiting on the other side of the trap, which the first character to go through Old Spikey will have to engage, unless it is killed by magic. I am assuming that you *can* send a fireball or a bomb through the trap as the spikes are open. They only close on a 1 or 2 as an adventurer passes through.

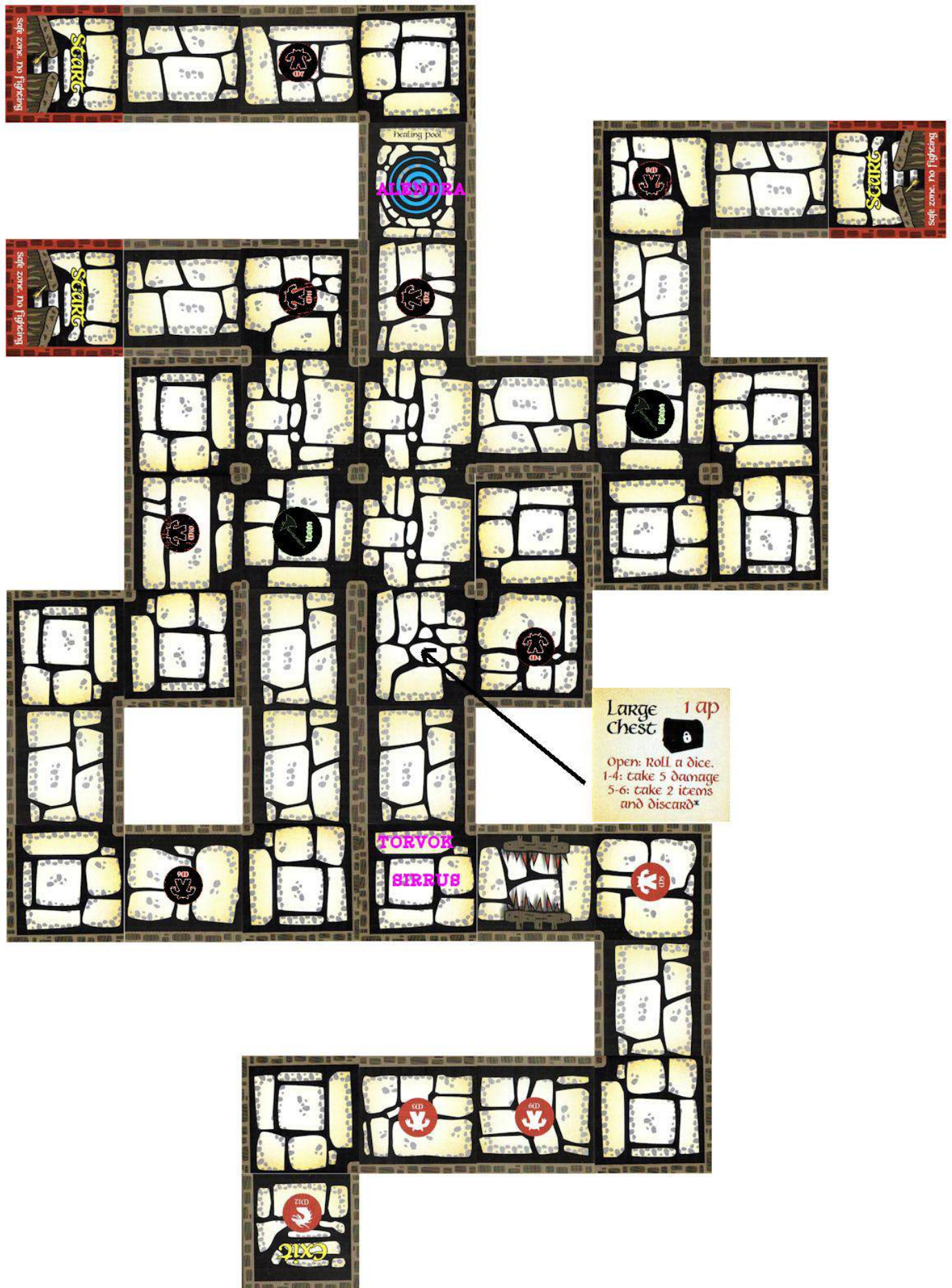

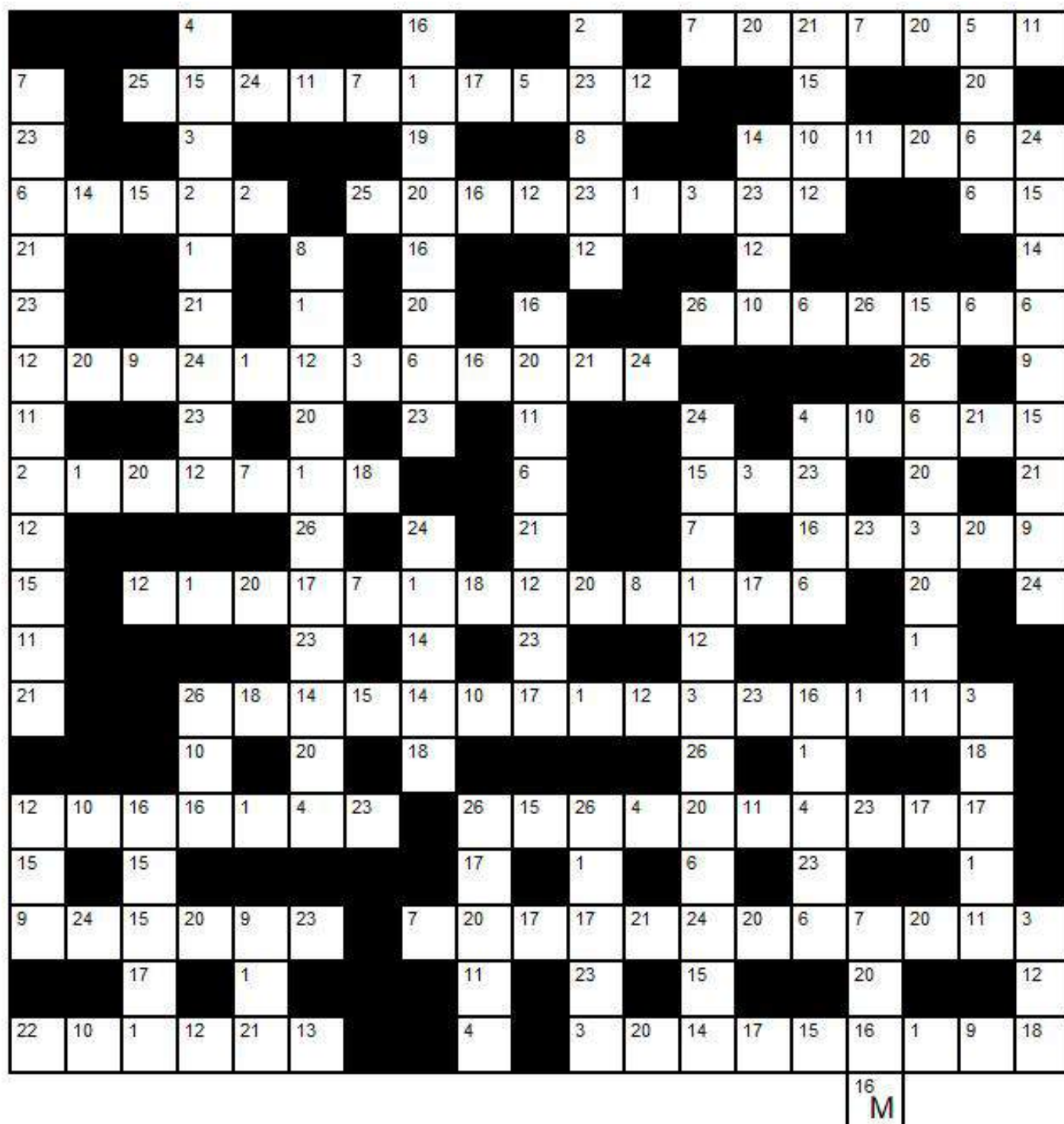

Each of the words in the puzzle is the name of a zine (past or present), the name of game popular in zines, the name of a GM, or a non-theme word (n.b. proper nouns and names are allowed in codewords). I did originally provide a colour-coded grid, but this made it far too easy! Also being a bit mean, there is only one start letter given (instead of the usual 3) and the one filled in for you isn't even in the grid!

HERE BE DRA**Serpents Gambit – GM roll = 3**

Bob acquires an item, Richard puts his Rolls of Silk up for sale for 2 gold, Likewise Chris puts his rolls of silk up for 2 gold. Chris also puts a silver dagger up for sale for 2 gold.

Players need to pick one of the three options below. In addition, you may also challenge Richard's and Chris' sale prices.

1 Acquire: You attempt to acquire a common or rare, good.

Example Order: "**ACQUIRE Common.**"

GM Action: The GM draws a new card for you, which will be sent to you if its value is equal or less than the GM dice roll.

2 Sell Goods: You attempt to sell one or more cards from your inventory.

Order: "**SELL for x**"

For any card you choose to sell, you can choose to bluff and say the card's value is higher than it is. The GM announces your intention to the other players, revealing only the bluff value.

Bluffing: Other players can challenge your value. If no one challenges you, you get your declared gold. If you are challenged, the GM reveals the card's real value. Challenges do not count as an order.

If your value was false: You get nothing for the sale and pay a penalty of 3 gold to the challenging player.

If your value was true: You receive the full value, and the challenging player pays you a penalty of 3 gold.

3 Gain Skill Card:

Order: "**Gain Skill.**"

If the GM roll is 2 or higher, you gain the skill card, which will be sent to you.

Some skill cards will be revealed once they have been used.

Any sales are processed before the players' orders. So, any skill obtained will not affect last turns sales/challenges.

Winning the game

The first player to accumulate 25 or more gold wins the game. Bob has 13 gold (after selling his Griffin feathers unchallenged). Richard has 10 gold. Chris has 12.

If 2 or more players achieve this on the same turn any player with the most gold will win.

Overview – You manage a team of 4 cyclists, scoring as many points as possible over a 10-lap race. You play one lap each turn.

The set up and replacement adjudication is the same as Breaking Away

Where the game differs is from turns 2 to 10 the rider(s) on the lowest hex are eliminated (these riders are included in the replacement card calculation). Scoring is also different. On turn three players score double the number of cyclists they have remaining. On turn seven players score triple the number of cyclists they have. On turn ten riders score according to their position the track. 10 points for first place 8 for second down to one for eighth. Tied positions are averaged.

I am looking for 5 to 6 players. You are welcome to send me your team set up as per the Breaking Away rules on the Variable Pig website: [Main Rules](#) and [Variants](#).

Postscript – I still need a player for snakes and ladders, although someone has suggested players could play two positions. Would anyone prefer not to do this? The pros are we could get the game started and give you a lot more information. The cons are it would double your workload and make it more difficult to avoid trapdoors.

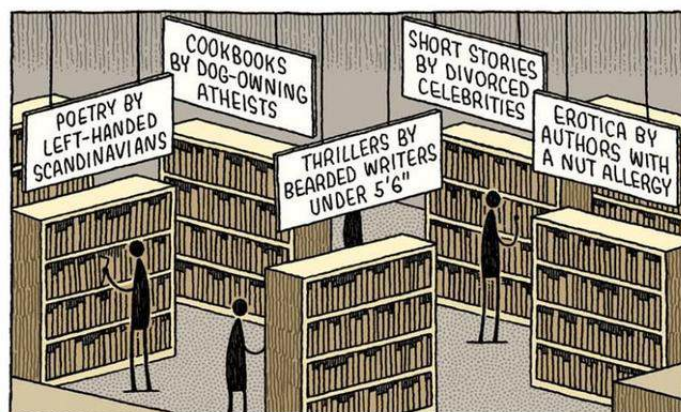
The "A Year Of Reading Dangerously" Edition

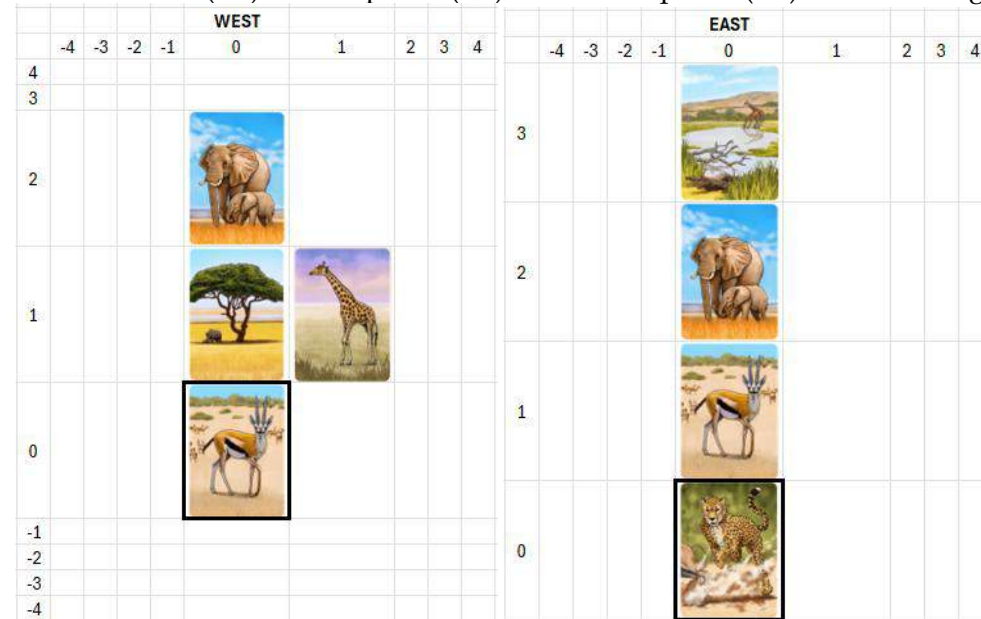

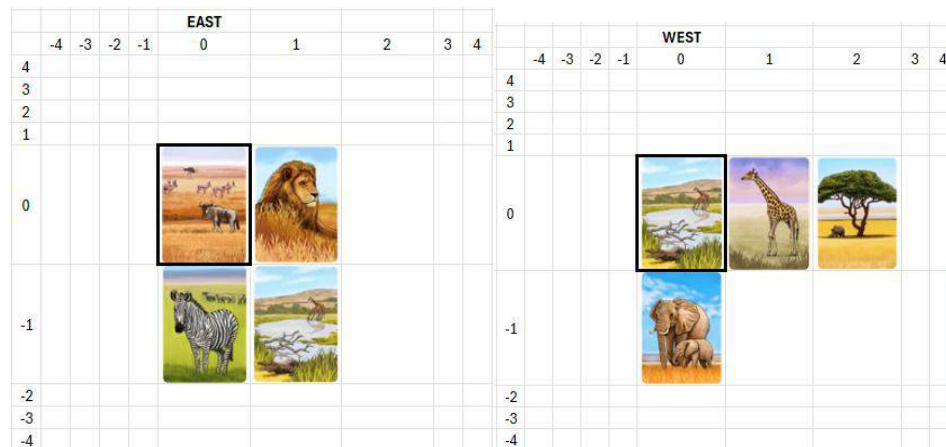

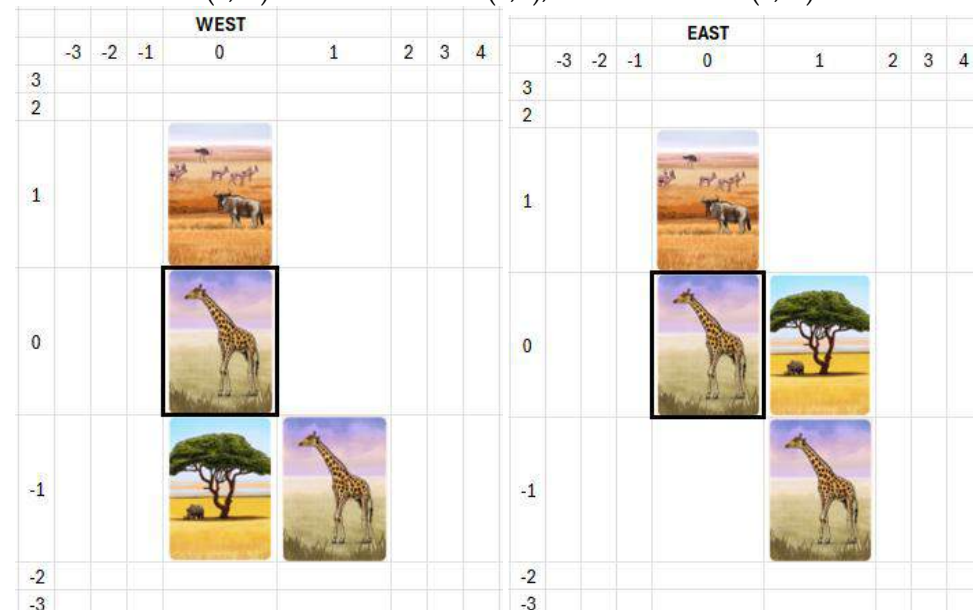

On the Border

We cancelled our planned trip to Germany this year as I was sure that my leg was not ready for the Bavarian Alps, so instead we decided to go to upstate New York and the border country along the St. Lawrence River. We stayed in Plattsburgh on the New York / Vermont state border and began the trip taking the ferry across Lake Champlain into Vermont for our first visit to the aptly named Green Mountain State. We then took a beautiful, scenic drive North to visit the Haskell Library and Opera House that straddles the Vermont / Quebec border. I first read about this in Breandan Whyte's 'Damn the Consequences' many years ago. This was built in 1904 as a gift from the Haskell family to commemorate the friendship between the US and Canada. The border literally runs through the building (the picture shows my boot in Canada and sandal in the US) and the opera house above. Sadly, the friendship between the two countries is a little strained right now, and a new entrance has been made on the Canadian side and visitors must leave via the entrance they came through. The road running beside the building that crosses the border has also been blocked with bollards; it is possible to still walk across the border, but we didn't see anyone try.

The next day we drove to Alexandria Bay in the heart of the 1000 islands region of the river. It was a depressing drive from Plattsburgh to Massena Springs where the border becomes the river, but much nicer once we could follow the river. We finished the day at the local drive-in. The next day it rained so we contented ourselves with a couple of winery tours and a visit to the Cornwall Brothers Museum, built in an 1866 General Store, which was very enjoyable. The rain cleared the next day, and we enjoyed a boat cruise around some of the islands, finishing at the picturesque Boldt Castle, before the ferry back to the mainland. It was a very enjoyable trip.

Total (Partial) Eclipse of the Heart

We didn't cancel our trip to the UK as I could now get around without the boot on even terrain. We were a little surprised by the scorching weather and how parched the land was. It was a relaxed trip visiting Jacqueline's sister Wendy and her family, including a visit to Avebury Manor which I hadn't visited before. It was very nicely laid out with a great history about the standing stones and how they were preserved.

The day before Cropredy was the partial eclipse and we had a lot of fun watching this in Mark and Nebby's garden, aided by one set of eclipse glasses (the other was borrowed), a pinhole camera and various devices to direct the sun's reflection onto a wall or floor. Practical physics in action. The heatwave meant we had great viewing conditions.

Walk Awhile

Packing for Cropredy was a little different this year with no need to pack the Sou'westers and arctic survival gear. I bought some lightweight trousers and a thin long-sleeved shirt to protect myself from sunburn and Jacqueline was similarly prepared. We didn't camp this year due to concerns about my foot, and I also rented a mobility scooter from Event Mobility that worked very well. Hook Norton's regular bitter, Hooky, was the preferred drink along with plenty of water. The festival capacity was again limited to 6500 and this worked well. There was plenty of good music to enjoy, including Banter, Hayseed Dixie and the Spooky Men's Chorale.

The Analog Kid

The first rock concert I went to was to see Rush at the Stafford Bingley Hall in 1981 on the 'Moving Pictures' tour. I didn't know much about Rush at the time but enjoyed the gig and later bought the 'Signals' album which got me hooked. Some 45 years later and more than 10 years after the death of their original drummer, Neil Peart, Rush were on tour again and we went to see them in Philadelphia. It was a great concert. The new drummer Annika Niles was great, and they have a keyboard player supporting them, rather than Geddy Lee (singer) playing bass pedals and keyboards. Geddy has talked about how they select their playlist for each concert based on location, so we weren't sure what songs they would play, beyond the big hits. I was very happy to hear both "Subdivisions" and "The Analog Kid" from the 'Signals' but missed "Vital Signs" and "Distant Early Warning".
